

Defense Gives CSC Upset 7-6 Win At Eau Claire

Closing their 1957 season on the same note upon which they opened it — with a victory and in the mud — Central State College's grid forces nipped Eau Claire State, Saturday night 7-6 at Carson Park in Eau Claire. In the season opener at Goerke Field the Pointers whipped Hamline University 20-6 in a steady rain.

The victory over the Blugolds revenge last year's 15-7 defeat at the hands of Eau Claire's loop co-champions at Goerke Field, and left the Pointers with a 2-4 Wisconsin College Conference record. CSC is 3-4 for the season. Eau Claire finished up its league season with a 3-4 record. They concluded their regular season with three victories and five defeats.

The Pointers, who passed only three times all night, were paced in the rushing department by full-back Fran Roman, who gained 45 yards on 13 carries. Eldon Scharp chipped in with 44 yards on seven carries and Ron "Jet" Hoenisch added 21 yards on 11 carries.

Senior halfback Bob Hessler, a 193 pound block buster, was Eau Claire's workhorse on the ground. The veteran Hessler gained 70 yards on 24 carries and scored the Blugold's only touchdown.

The Pointers scored four minutes and 40 seconds after the opening kickoff and from that point on it was a hard fought, punishing battle of lines in the mud and a duel of punters. The line was about even, and the punting was a standoff—each team booting eight times with only one yard difference in distance. End Bill Perkins handled the Blugold's kicking and Jack Charlesworth and Dennis Schmidke, Pointer quarterbacks, handling those duties for CSC.

After the Pointers had held Eau Claire without a first down following the opening kickoff, the Pointers took over on their own 37 following Perkins' punt. With Fran Roman, Ron Hoenisch and Eldon Scharp carrying the ball, the Pointers picked up four first downs and marched all the way on the ground. Scharp picked up a key first down on a quick opener which netted five yards to the Blugold 10. Hoenisch then scooted around end for nine more to the one and Charlesworth punched it over on second down on a quarterback sneak.

Don Ryskoski then booted the extra point from placement and the Pointers had a 7-0 lead.

The Pointers were never again to put together a sustained drive, but the Blugolds put on two of them—and they started the first after Lee took Ryskoski's kickoff on the two yard line and returned to his own 22. They ran 17 plays in succession on the drive, picking up five first downs and moving all the way to the Pointer 19.

Hessler carried nine times in the drive and gained 44 yards. However, after Hessler had picked up a first down on the Pointer 20, Dale Schallert stopped the big Blugold ace after a five yard gain to the 15, a five yard penalty moved the ball back to the 20, and Dave Kawleski and Jim Luedtke teamed up to stop Hessler for no gain on second down. Lee picked up a yard up the middle to the 19 before Clarence Lacina and Luedtke stopped him and on fourth down Lee's pass was incomplete.

It was a tremendous stand after such a determined drive had met with such success, and it upset Eau Claire's hopes of scoring while there was still solid turf to run on.

CSC took over on the 19 and on first down Scharp bolted 11 yards for a first down on the Pointer 30. Roman and Hoenisch moved the ball to the 36, but a mixup in the backfield and a misguided pitchout cost the Pointers eight yards back to their own 28 from where Charlesworth punted to the Blugold 45 and a return was made to the 50.

There were then five exchanges of punts after neither team could pick up a first down in the second period. With three minutes

remaining in the half the Pointers were put into good position on the Blugold 46 when Hoenisch returned Perkins' punt 19 yards. In five downs the Pointers moved to the Blugold 33, and on fourth down Ryskoski attempted a field goal from the 41 yard line. The boot was short and Eau Claire took over on its own 20. After

two running plays the half ended. The second half started out as another punting duel. The Pointers received, could not gain, punted; the Blugolds could not gain and punted and the Pointers moved to the Blugold 37 where Ryskoski attempted another field goal. It was short and Lee returned from the five to the 17.

The Blugolds now began their second sustained drive and this one used up 16 consecutive plays. Lee, the rain which had been falling throughout having stopped now, passed five times in the drive, completing four in a row. The big gainer was a 26 yard toss to Pete Adler to the Pointer 47. The Blugolds picked up six first downs on their way, the last on the Pointer two yard line. Hessler bucked over on second down to cut the margin to 7-6, but Owen Schwerdtfeger and Fritz Kestly stopped Hessler's run for the extra point. That was the ball game.

There were seven punts in a row into the fourth period, with neither team able to gain. With two and one half minutes remaining in the game, and the Blugolds on their own 33, Schallert intercepted Dick Odegard's pass and the Pointers took over at that point. Two plays later, however, Schmidke fumbled and the Blugolds recovered on their own 30. Two passes by Lee were incomplete and time ran out.

Bays Fail At Goal Line—Giants Win, 31-17

GREEN BAY (AP)—The Green Bay Packers made a couple of costly misplays and once wilted before the tremendous defense of the New York Giants who made their own breaks in rolling to a 31-17 National Football League victory Sunday.

Showing one of their better ground attacks of the season, to keep pace with their good passing, the Packers scored one of their touchdowns by springing Don McIlhenny through the line and he was off on a 40-yard run into the end zone. The other came on a Bart Starr to Bill Howton pass play that covered 76 yards. Fred Cone's two conversions and 39-yard field goal completed the Packer scoring.

Green Bay earned position in the final quarter when rookie Paul Hornung, playing at full-back, ripped off a 72-yard run to the Giant eight. A pass interference penalty moved the Packers to the one, but they failed to score when unable to dent the New York line in four thrusts.

The bruising goal line stand killed off a Packer chance for a 24-24 tie, and secured the victory. A blocked punt and an intercepted pass produced two touchdowns for the defending champions Giants who got two others in the climax of long drives. Ben Agajanian added four conversions and a 12-yard field goal.

The defeat left the Packers with a 2-4 record, and they dropped into a last place tie in the Western Conference with the Los Angeles Rams and Chicago

Bears. With a 4-2 slate, New York is tied with the Pittsburgh Steelers for second place in the Eastern Conference. A capacity crowd of 32,070 saw the game in New York City Stadium. It was the last Green Bay appearance of the year for the Packers.

After it was over Green Bay Coach Liz Blackburn said, "We played our best game of the season. It was the breaks," he said, but quickly added, "you've got to score from the one-yard line. That's when we lost the game."

Giants Coach Jim Lee Howell agreed "breaks did it." He felt the game "could have gone either way. Those Packers hit hard. This was the hardest we've been hit all year."

Howell called Hornung "great," and said Howton was in "a class by himself."

The Packers kicked off, but the first time they got their hands on the ball they began to roll smartly toward the New York goal. The drive ended abruptly on Green Bay's first miff, Hornung's fumble that was recovered by the Giants. Shortly after that New York got its first touchdown when Dick Deschaine went back to punt from his own 10. Cliff Livingston blocked the kick and the ball rolled into the end zone and Sam Huff fell on it for New York.

The Packers tied the score a minute later on the Starr to Howton pass. The second quarter was all Giants as they rolled up 17 points on Frank Gifford's three-yard run and a three-yard pass from Charley Conerly to Ken MacCafee and Agajanian's field goal. The field goal by Cone was the only successful Packer effort.

The Packers took over at the start of the second half and for the first time this season scored during the third period. The 73-yard drive ended with McIlhenny's 40-yard run, and the Packers trailed 24-17.

On the first play of the final period the Packers went for a tie when Starr and Howton hooked up again, but the ball sailed just over the big end's fingers. On the next play Hornung cracked over left tackle and went 72 yards to the New York eight, where he was pulled down from behind.

Cone reached the six, and on the following play, a Starr to Howton pass, the Giants were charged with interference and Green Bay had it on the one, first down and goal to go. Starr tried twice. Hornung tried twice. Each time the Giant line threw them back.


The next time they got the ball Green Bay fought for yardage, and got a first down on the Giant 30, but as he was going down

Ron Kramer threw a lateral that went out of bounds, five yards in back of him. The Giants took over and with only about a minute remaining got their final touchdown.

New York moved to the Green Bay 35 where Alex Webster fumbled and Bill Forester fell on it for the Packers. Babe Parilli came in to throw the long one, but it was intercepted by Em Tunnell who raced 52 yards to the goal line.

Whitefish Bay, in Class B, just shaded Madison West to take its title.

P. J. Jacobs' Panthers, with Gof Thomson and Bill Krubsack left at home with the flu, were paced by Jim Cherney, who finished eighth in the Class B division. Cherney covered the two and two-tenths miles course in 11:36. Dick McDermott, Whitefish Bay, copped first in the division in 11:14.7.

Bob Zinda was 18th for the Panthers in 12:01, and Roy Benson, bothered by a severe cold, was forced to drop out of the race after a mile and one half. Bruce Laube finished 116th for the Panthers.

Cherney's performance was the best ever recorded by a Panther athlete in the meet, and Coach John De Witte felt that he was justified in believing that had he had his team at full strength, the Panthers might have taken the crown.
